in New Brunswick and Director of The Hamilton Lab. She completed her PhD in clinical psychology at	
Temple University and her clinical internship and postdoctoral fellowship in the Department of	
Psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh. Her research examines modifiable risk and protective factors	
for suicidal thoughts and behaviors among adolescents, with particular focus on social media use and	
sleep. Dr. Hamilton harnesses innovative technological methods (e.g., smartphone sensing, EMA, and	
actigraphy) to examine these processes in real time to understand proximal risk for suicidal thoughts. She also conducts focus groups and works with adolescents on her youth advisory boards to ensure her
